GOVERNANCE PILOT WITH DISCOVERY HAS STARTED VERY WELL

During the first 3 months, 105 surgeons signed up for the pilot project. More than 1500 discharge summaries were completed and as a result, Discovery Health paid out over R700 000 in additional remuneration to participating surgeons. Surgicom signed up 30 new members, boosting membership figures to over 250.

THE FIRST PILOT PROFILES ARE READY TO BE SENT TO PARTICIPATING SURGEONS

All surgeons participating in the pilot will receive their first report within the next few weeks. The data is derived from 1 January to 31 December 2015 and focusses on the five selected procedures. This will enable participants to understand how the profile reports work, examining historical data. Reports based on data collected after the initiation of the pilot will then be sent out every six months. The information presented includes volumes of cases, patient demographics, outcome including readmission rates, length of stay and overall costs as well as a quality score and efficiency score for each of the five procedures when compared to the national benchmark. The Surgicom board believes that simply informing surgeons of how they compare to their peers in terms of outcomes, costs and efficiencies will be a powerful inducement to better practice.

The point of data sharing and the basis for the R380 payment per event is the discharge summary. This works through Health ID, either on the web or on an i-pad, but in order to access a patient's Health ID record the patient's consent is required. Surgeons are urged to request their staff to obtain this digitally whenever they register a DHMS patient. Once the initial consent at registration has been obtained it follows through to the discharge summary and all subsequent interactions with this patient. If the initial registration process, including obtaining consent was incomplete, the Health ID will reflect "Consent required" before allowing you to proceed with the discharge summary. An additional R75 is paid directly to you every time you access a patient record on Health ID for a consultation or event.

There are four ways to obtain consent:

- **I-Pad:** If you have the Health ID app on I-pad (recommended), The patient signs on the screen to give consent
- **Web:** Go to www.discovery.co.za and select 'HealthID Consent'
- **Discovery App for Smartphones:** Most DH patients have the DH app on their smart phone. They can select HealthID consent and nominate you as a doctor that can have access to their health record.
- **SMS:** Almost everyone can send an SMS to 31347: Consent3, patient's date of birth, doctor's individual practice number eg; Consent3, 19700726, 1543261

A SUPREME COURT RULING OF CONSIDERABLE IMPORTANCE

Several medical schemes have asserted that they have a right to choose whether to pay the patient or the service provider directly. This has been used as a powerful inducement for doctors to sign provider contracts and has been used by schemes as a punitive measure against doctors. This issue has been pronounced upon by the Supreme Court of Appeals in the case of **Sechaba Medical Solutions (Pty) Ltd and others v William Sekete and others (case no: 216/2014)** in which the court decided, amongst others, that section 59(2) of the Medical Schemes Act does not afford this discretion to medical schemes. The salient portion of the judgment is *"It seems to me that when a member obtains medical services and arranges for the service provider to submit their account to the medical scheme, they are authorising the medical scheme to pay the service provider and not the member."* The Sechaba decision is extremely significant. The judgment was reiterated by the Council for Medical Schemes in a recent appeal. Medical Schemes do not have the right to elect whom they reimburse for services rendered. They are required to pay the service provider directly. Discovery Health has indicated that they view this ruling as applicable only to medical schemes that have been liquidated and have no intention of changing their payment arrangements. Surgicom and other specialist groups will be engaging further on this issue.

REIMBURSEMENT FOR LAPAROSCOPIC SURGERY

Surgicom members continue to experience difficulties with full re-imburement for laparoscopic procedures when dealing with certain medical schemes, particularly Medihelp and GEMS. The Surgicom Board has tasked John Strachan with engaging with these schemes to resolve the difficulties. John will harness the assistance of SASES in a joint initiative which will be evidence-based and reflect best clinical practice in 2016.

PRACTICE COST STUDIES IN 2017

Surgeons in private practice are once again being asked to justify the fees that they charge. This is implied in the Health Market Inquiry deliberations and the discussions ahead of the possible introduction of National Health Insurance. We face renewed calls for price regulation in private practice and the imposition of pre-determined tariffs. In order to answer these challenges it will be necessary to conduct proper cost-studies as the high costs of running surgical practices are the basis for the fees that we charge. The previously conducted studies are considered to be out of date. Surgicom will take a lead in initiating these studies which we anticipate will begin in 2017. Surgicom members are encouraged to participate in these. Our livelihood is at stake.
